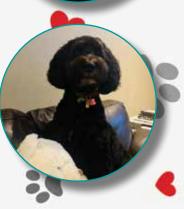

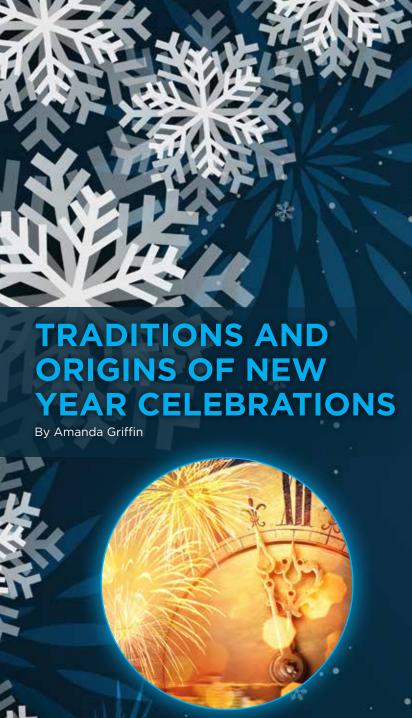








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At some point in our lives, we've all most likely participated in one or more of the traditions of kissing at midnight, eating Hoppin' John, sung Auld Lang Syne, or made the almost obligatory new year's resolution, because we've been taught that it's "just what you do." Have you ever wondered why though? For instance, did you know that the practice of making resolutions for the new year is said to have begun with the Babylonians as early as 2600 B.C. as a way to reflect on the past and plan ahead. That's right, whether you realized it or not, you were tapping into an ancient and powerful longing for a fresh start. But, before the morning of the first day of the new year dawns, there are celebratory traditions practiced during the final moments of the year—what are they, where did they originate, and why?

KISSING AT MIDNIGHT. Contrary to popular belief, there is no truth, or even any real meaning, to the tradition of kissing at midnight as "a way to ward off a year of loneliness and misery." The practice has been traced back thousands of years to the Roman Festival of Saturnalia which included a lot of kissing and debauchery because well, those Romans apparently knew how to party! Interestingly, Saturnalia is also at the root of the tradition of kissing under the mistletoe. Ancient Greeks would kiss underneath the parasitic plant, considered to be associated with fertility, and Romans would reconcile differences with enemies under mistletoe because it was thought to symbolize peace.

During the Renaissance, masquerade balls were all the rage across Europe, and kisses were purported to be a way of purifying each other from evil. Thus, it came to be considered a way of starting the new year with a clean slate. English and German folklore then built upon this idea, and the superstition "that a midnight kiss strengthens a budding romance and that avoiding it could mean a loveless year ahead", spread like wildfire. If, however, you are worried about being kiss-less as the new year begins, you may want to take a trip to Scotland for Hogmanay, the Scottish new year celebration. There, it is tradition to kiss everyone in the room as a way of connecting friends and strangers.





**AULD LANG SYNE.** Written by 18th century Scottish poet Robert Burns, it literally translates as "old long ago." It has endured the ages, spreading from Scotland throughout the English-speaking world. According to Scotland.org, it is about the love and kindness of days gone by, but also gives us a sense of belonging and fellowship to take into the future.

**TIMES SQUARE.** The first New Year's Eve celebration in Times Square was in 1904, culminating in fireworks. The city banned fireworks two years later and, according to TimesSquareNYC.org, event organizers decided to have a 700-pound iron and wood ball lowered down a pole. Since then, it's become a tradition for Americans to watch the ball begin its decent at 11:59, and then count down the final ten seconds to midnight as the ball reaches the bottom.

A MIDNIGHT TOAST. The pop of the champagne cork at midnight is now considered the universal signal of the arrival of a new year, but this tradition is rooted in other celebratory beverages and practices, some of which are still practiced today. Wassail, a hot punch-like drink named after the Gaelic term for "good health", is still served in some parts of England and the US. Scotland has its own version of Wassail—a spiced "hot pint", which the Scotts drink to each other's prosperity. This was also offered to neighbours along with a small gift. And in Holland, toasts are made with a hot, spiced wine.

A WELCOMING BANG. Welcoming the new year with a lot of noise—whether fireworks, gun shots, church bells, loud singing, cheering, or toy noisemakers—is a favourite activity all around the world. In China, firecrackers blasted away the forces of darkness, and in ancient Thailand, guns were fired to frighten off the demons. In the early American colonies, pistol shots rang through the air. Today, these have, for the most part, been replaced with sirens, fireworks, party horns, and other less dangerous noise makers.

**BLACK-EYED PEAS.** Most traditions and celebrations involve food, and the coming of the new year is no exception. Of course, in the US many eat some form of Hoppin' John—black-eyed peas (originally domesticated in West Africa) mixed with pork and rice, which is thought to have originated in the Low Country of South Carolina in the 1800s. Although it's commonly believed to bring luck and peace in the coming year to anyone who eats it, according to History.com, the true origin is anything but peaceful. It is actually a byproduct rooted deeply in the African slave trade, most likely by slave traders who saw the domesticated black-eyed pea crops in West Africa as an economical way to feed their human cargo and then brought the crop to America.

In Spain, there is a tradition of eating twelve grapes at midnight— one for each chime of the clock. In Dutch homes, fritters called olie bollen are served because it's believed that eating any ring-shaped treat symbolizes "coming full circle" and leads to good fortune. The Irish celebrate with pastries called bannocks—a tasty traditional loaf similar to a scone. In India and Pakistan, rice is thought to promise prosperity. In the Jewish faith, it's tradition to eat apples dipped in honey as part of the Rosh Hashanah celebration.

No matter how you choose to celebrate the transition of old to new year, statistics show year after year that it's probably best to take it a little easy on the new year's resolutions, so you don't set yourself up with unrealistic challenges before the year even gets going.

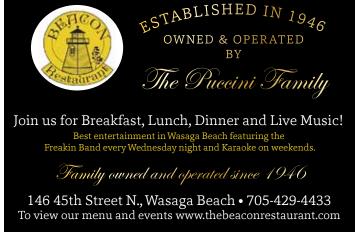

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### FUN SKATING DRILLS FOR YOUR NEXT PRACTICE

Skating is an essential skill in hockey. After all, you can't really play if you can't skate. Even though skating is so important, learning how to strengthen your skating ability can seem tedious and mundane. You can only do so many Russian Circles and power turn drills before you start to feel like they're unimportant. Luckily, there is an excessive amount of unique power skating drills that you can bring to your coach. Next practice, ask them if you can try some of these out! These drills can be done with or without pucks.

#### ONE LEG EDGE HOLDS

Start in the corner (any one of the five will do). Remember to have an explosive start, and skate towards the top of the circle. Once you reach the top of the circle, lift your right leg and keep it up as you follow the path of the circle. Challenge yourself to make it all the way around on one leg with your momentum! You can practice this drill on all four edges by changing which leg you hold up and which direction you go.

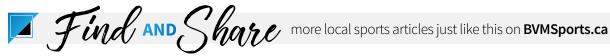
#### ONE LEG SLALOM

Start on the goal line and face the other end of the ice. Take a couple of strides and start to balance on one leg. From here, make small and powerful "c" cuts from your inside to outside edges and vice versa to propel yourself forward. The secret to this drill is in the name.

When a skier is slaloming, they are transferring their weight side to side when they make a cut. Focus on your weight distribution and challenge yourself to master this skill on both legs!

#### SHOOT THE DUCK

This drill is a little more popular. Start on the goal line again. Take a couple of strides, drop down into a pistol squat position, and hold as long as you can. The trick to this drill is finding your center of gravity. It might take a few tries, but it's great for practicing balance and control!

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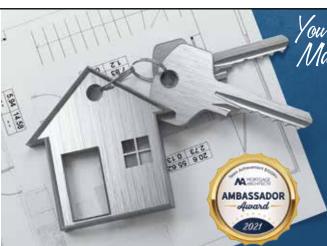
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We live in a world overflowing with substances that can be harmful to the environment, humans, and to our furry family members as well. Whenever possible, I like to take a more natural approach to keeping my home clean and fresh. Here are a few natural hacks that are easy, cost-effective, and get the job done. And bonus, you probably already have the supplies around your home!

#### Get rid of shower head build-up with white vinegar

Use vinegar to dissolve the accumulated mineral deposits in your showerhead. Those deposits build up and can restrict water flow and reduce water pressure over time. Fill a plastic bag with white vinegar, secure it over the shower head with a rubber band and let it soak for several hours. The build-up should dissolve and easily rinse off.

#### Use baking soda to clean stainless-steel sinks

Sprinkle baking soda onto your wet faucet and sink basin and allow it to sit for a few minutes before scrubbing with a scrubby sponge. Adding a bit of salt to the baking soda will give it even more power.

#### Use newspaper and white vinegar to clean dirty windows and mirrors

Mix a quarter cup of white vinegar with two cups of warm water and two teaspoons of liquid soap in a spray bottle. Then just spray the mixture onto the window or mirror and wipe off with dry newspaper for a streak-free clean.

#### Use fresh lemon to remove water stains from faucets

Cut a fresh lemon in half and rub it on water-stained faucets to remove the marks and residue caused by hard water.

#### Use cream of tartar to clean toasters and kettles

Create a milky paste with cream of tartar and water. Rub the paste onto your stainless-steel appliances and then wipe away to return them to their original shine.

#### Use fresh lemon to clean your microwave

Cut a fresh lemon into quarters, squeeze the juice into a half cup of water and drop in the rind pieces. Microwave on high for three minutes and let stand in the microwave for an additional five minutes so the steam can loosen the grimy buildup. Then use a dry cloth to simply wipe the microwave out. When you're done, run them through your garbage disposal to give your kitchen a fresh lemony scent.

#### Clean your grill with vinegar and onion

Heat up your grill and then wet a small area by spraying on white vinegar to help loosen up the residue. Scrub the area firmly with the open face of half an onion. The acid from the onion will get rid of any leftover grub.

# **HOT CRANBERRY ORANGE T**

Warm up with a comforting tea made with an immune-boosting blend of cranberries, oranges and spices.

- 12 oz. fresh cranberries
- 12 cups water
- 2 sliced oranges
- 1 cup honey
- 1/4 cup sugar (add little or more as needed for desired sweetness)
- 4 black tea bags
- 4 cinnamon sticks
- 1/2 teaspoon whole cloves

# Virections

1. Bring cranberries to a boil in large stockpot.

Simmer for about 30 minutes until cranberries are soft.

- 2. Add sliced oranges, honey, sugar, cloves, cinnamon sticks and tea bags to pot.
- 3. Let tea bags steep for 5 minutes and remove.
- 4. Simmer for additional 45 minutes with burner on low.
- 5. Strain using a cheesecloth and sieve.

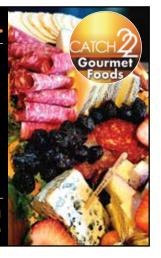
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# **ALL-PURPOSE BREAKFAST SMOOTHIE**

This is the easiest smoothie recipe in the world to remember because it's just one of everything! It's been my go-to weekday breakfast for years and I keep multiple varieties of frozen fruit on hand so I can swap them in and out. It works best with a high-powered blender.

# Ingredients

- 1 cup cold tea (I use brewed green tea that I make in advance and keep in the fridge)
- 1 cup spinach (you could also use kale or any other dark, leafy green)
- 1 cup frozen fruit (my favourites are mango, cherries and banana)
- 1 Tbsp protein powder (I use whey protein isolate. Pea protein is also good, though it has a bit of an aftertaste that takes some getting used to.)

- 1 Tbsp hemp hearts
- 1 Tbsp ground flax seed
- 1 Tbsp chia seeds

Add all the ingredients to the blender in the order specified and slowly increase the speed, blending on high until smooth. Adjust the thickness to your preference by adding a bit more fruit or tea as needed.





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
