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Growing up in Creemore in the 1980s, Laura LaChapelle was very aware of being different from everyone else.

LaChappelle is the program director for Making Change, a not-for-profit organization of community volunteers led by Black women and launched in 2019 with a goal to spark community interest and foster conversations around inclusion and diversity, with a focus on Black culture and community and anti-Black racism.

"There was a huge transition to go from downtown Toronto to Creemore ... so definitely my childhood was a unique experience," said LaChapelle, who is also deeply involved in theatre arts throughout the south Georgian Bay region, particularly with youth. "There were times when it was really, really tough, but it also was part of what made me stronger."

Making Change, in partnership with the Wasaga Beach Public Library, is hosting a Black History Month event: Mosaic of

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

Black Culture.

"To have an event that says, 'Hev, we're here, too' is so meaningful to that small percentage of the community," LaChapelle said. "It is an opportunity for education, for those who are of various different backgrounds, to learn about Black culture."

The event will feature an overview of Black history by Making Change speaker Debbie Opoku-Mulder, with traditional Caribbean music by award-winning steel pan performer Pan Fyah.

There will be a chance for kids to try the steel pan themselves and make their own drum to take

Kyle Young, the community relations assistant at the library, said the event ties in with the library's mandate to promote diversity and inclusion.

"The great thing about this event is it is for all ages," Young said. "It really provides an opportunity for people to come together and celebrate the diversity

that is continuing to change this community."

The library will feature a selection of Black authors and literature for Black History Month, as well as a display of hand drums.

Attendees will also have a chance to add their mark to the Diversity Tapestry, a 15-foot-long canvas covered by the imprints of people's hands in a variety of colours: white, beige, red, brown and black. LaChapelle said those who added their handprints to the tapestry during other events across the county did so with "real mindfulness.

"It's the natural beauty of our natural skin that we're seeing in Simcoe County," she said. "There have been some Indigenous families who have come, and it was the red paint that spoke to them, and they chose to do red handprints.

"There have been some people who picked the black handprint because they were feeling empowered by being part of this moment. It really is a personal choice of colour."

Aliza Blair is a recent arrival to the community and sees her involvement as a presenter for the educational component of Making Change as "an opportunity for me to volunteer in the community for the first time.

"I'm excited that we're putting events together all around Simcoe County to bring education and knowledge and entertainment throughout the community that shows the Black community," she said.

Originally from Kenya, Blair, ਟੱ a realtor, grew up in Winnipeg and lived in Brampton before bringing her family to Wasaga Beach two years ago.

"I started to really think about 🤻 where I needed to go in order to raise my kids. Winnipeg has a 8 small-town community feel, and I wanted that same experience for my children," she said. "What I have found, not just for me, but for my children, is that we have felt extremely included."

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WASAGA BEACH RECEIVES FIRST CHEQUE FROM GATEWAY CASINO

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Wasaga Beach's take of gaming revenue from the town's new casino has rolled in.

On Jan. 27, the town accepted its first payment under its municipal contribution agreement with the Ontario Lottery and Gaming Corporation: more than \$152,000, representing the first 39 days of operation for Gateway Casino and Entertainment's Playtime facility.

"Thirty-nine days is a number I will never forget," Mayor Brian Smith joked as he accepted the ceremonial cheque from OLG at a ceremony recognizing the grand opening of Playtime Casino Wasaga Beach. "I'm looking forward to seeing what 90 (days) does, and I'm sure council is chomping at the bit to figure out how we're going to use these dollars."

"This is an extremely exciting day for the Town of Wasaga Beach, and an extremely grateful day."

Along with the cheque presentation, Smith cut the ribbon to of-

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ficially open the casino, more than two months after the facility's soft open in late November.

Gateway — through its community giving program, Gateway Gives — also presented a \$5,000 cheque to the Wasaga Beach Ministerial Food Bank, as a portion of the casino's food and beverage sales at the Match Eatery and Public House.

Gateway's chief marketing and communications officer Carrie Kormos said she has been at openings of the company's casinos across the country, and "what I've seen here at Wasaga Beach truly stands apart.

"We have been warmly welcomed by this community from the day we announced our intention to locate here," she said.

Gateway's capital investment in Wasaga Beach was \$34.3 million, and the casino and restaurant employs 140 people."

Since OLG's modernization program began more than a decade ago, there has been \$1.8 billion in private sector capital investment in Ontario, said OLG's

director of media relations Tony Bitonti.

Since 1994, when host municipalities began receiving a share of casino revenue, gaming has put more than \$1.93 billion into

communities, Bitonti added.

Bitonti noted that the opening of Wasaga Beach's casino has been "quite significant," even in comparison with other casino openings across the province. "It has done well, for these numbers (of revenue), and there's every indication it will continue to do well," he said. "The community has embraced it."

The town's next payment will come in mid-April, and represent revenue from Jan. 1 to March 31. Under the terms of the agreement, host communities receive their revenue 21 days after the close of the quarter; Wasaga Beach had already received its "real" cheque, prior to the Jan. 27 ceremony.

The town will now need to determine how to spend its gaming revenue. The town conducted a public engagement process in the fall, and in December, municipal staff presented a draft policy to council. Smith told Simcoe.com the final version of that policy will come to the council table for discussion in the near future.

Under the municipal contribution agreement, the town receives 5.25 per cent of the first \$65 million of slot revenue, and three per cent of the next \$135 million of slot revenue.



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SYSTEMIC RACISM HAS ALWAYS BEEN A REAL AND PRESENT DANGER

CULTURAL HEALING E WILL REQUIRE MUCH EFFORT. JANIE COOPER-WILSON WRITES

The majority of descendants of the first-generation Black people to arrive in the Georgian Bay area are able to directly trace their lineage to the Queen's Bush Settlement in Wellington county and to the Oro Black Settlement near Edgar, and indirectly to every Black settlement in Ontario, as well as to every American slave state.

New residents and tourists alike are usually under the misconception people of African descent were not visible in the northern townships until the late 1950s, when single women from the British West Indies came to Canada as part of the West Indian Domestic Scheme.

Yet, it is a well-documented fact people of African descent have been longstanding residents and an integral part of the landscape of Simcoe and Grey counties, since the earliest years of the 19th century.

The first-generation Black pioneers would have travelled along either the Penetanguishene Road (est. c. 1814), or the Garafraxa Road (now, Highway 6, est. c. 1837), the only access roads into the area.

Although, people of African descent became legally free in Canada in 1834, widespread cultural propaganda, discriminatory and marginalization practices, firmly trenched since the late 18th century, forced early Black residents to remain silent and keep a low profile, as they struggled to survive injustice on a daily basis.

Until recent years, the history of people of African descent in Ontario was ignored, purposely obliterated, or relegated to an occasional footnote in dusty textbooks. Regardless of the many and great advancements made to educate the public and bring about healing change, it is a sad fact there remains distinct reluctance within presentday society to accept the validity of Canada's history from the Black perspective.


To do so requires an admission that systemic racism has always been a real and present danger within our midst. Cultural healing will require far more than sugar-coating the truth and paying lip service to the concept of equality, diversity and inclusivity; it will require honest self-evaluation of our core values and the willingness to participate in uncomfortable conversations.

The older generations have long-since passed to their Glory and their faces may have faded from the visible past. Yet, they haven't been forgotten.

The stories of their courageous lives are being revived, recorded and passed on by committed descendants, through the written and spoken word, music, song, film and dance.

The Ancestors live on through the accomplishments of their living descendants, who have aspired to and achieved excellence in every profession and the arts.

DO YOUR HOMEWORK. Educating yourself about the realities of racism and discrimination is a good place to start. Take the time to read, listen, watch and deepen your understanding.

> SUPPORT BLACK-OWNED BUSINESSES. Black business owners still face prejudice as an extension of racial discrimination. It's important to seek out Black bookstores, restaurants and even Black vendors, and support them on a regular basis.

> ATTEND BLACK HISTORY MONTH EVENTS. When you learn about Black History Month events happening, it's important to show up to support the organizations presenting them. Local libraries, schools and museums will be having Black History Month events this year.

LISTEN. Learn from others about the struggles and obstacles they've faced. Ask permission first before you comment, question or share. Approach asking questions with humility and a learning mindset.

GET COMFORTABLE WITH BEING UNCOMFORTABLE. Reflect on what you can do differently. Are there situations where you could be more deliberate with your words? When you've learned more, you'll feel more solid in your ability to step in and speak up. The process of "unlearning" happens over time and requires an investment of energy. But embrace discomfort, make mistakes and stay engaged. Allyship isn't a one-off event. It takes consistent work over time. Not just in February.

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

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WASAGA TO ASK PROVINCE TO SELL, SWAP UNUSED LANDS

PROVINCE OWNS SEVERAL PROPERTIES **INCLUDING AN** 18-ACRE PARCEL ON MOSLEY STREET. **ACROSS FROM** SKATEBOARD PARK

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Wasaga Beach will ask the province to look at selling off or swapping properties it owns that would be better used for housing.

The issue of provincially owned lands came up at co-ordinated council's committee meeting Jan. 19 during a discussion about how the municipality should respond to an amendment to the County of Simcoe's official plan.

The amendment would be the first phase of a municipal comprehensive review of the county's official plan that would implement a land needs assessment.

This process is required by the province and would assign the county's 16 municipalities a growth target for 2051. The majority of residential and employment growth in the county is directed to primary settlement areas, of which Wasaga Beach is not considered one.

Wasaga Beach's position is that it should be considered a settlement area in the province's Growth Plan. This position is now supported by the county, says the town's senior planner Matt Ellis, and would set a population target for the town of more than 46,000 by 2051.

Having provincially owned property designated as developable land, in areas already serviced, would help in hitting that target — as well as the pro-

vincial goal to see 1.5 million homes built during the next 10 years, the committee decided.

"They're prime properties that could be developed for the town," Coun. Ellen Timms said.

The issue of so-called "orphaned" properties has come to the council table several times during the last eight years, notably during Mayor Brian Smith's first term in 2014-18.

The regulated provincial park is more than 4,500 acres. However, there are a number of lots, particularly along Shore Lane, expropriated in the 1970s when the park was created.

The lots are not contiguous to the main park, but are included in the same assessment roll number and therefore are valued much lower than if they were a standard residential building lot.

Infrastructure Ontario also holds an 18-acre parcel on Mosley Street, across Wasaga Beach's skateboard park, assessed at \$118,000.

Andrew McNeill, the town's chief administrative officer, said the province may not be sure what lands it owns within the town boundaries.

"There is a disconnect between (Municipal Affairs Minister Steve Clark) looking for lands to develop housing and understanding what they actually own," he said. "If we can help bridge and connect the dots for the province, that would be quite beneficial for the Town of Wasaga Beach."

Smith noted the province owns some very significant properties "that are worth millions of dollars. The fact that they haven't been developed, they've been allowed (to get) overgrown, and not maintained ... from the time they were expropriated until now, the annual dollar value in tax revenue the town has not received from the province or someone developing those properties, it is very significant dollars," he

Smith also suggested a land swap with the province for municipal-owned lands the town is unlikely to use and may be adjacent provincially owned property.

"We could put those lands on the table," Doug Herron, director of planning, said. "We have done so in the past, so it should not be a surprise to them."





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

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LOCAL MAN USES POLAND EXPERIENCE TO RAISE CASH FOR UKRAINE

Months after he returned from a stint helping people who were fleeing the war in Ukraine, a south Georgian Bay man continues to spread the word that the people of the eastern European nation still need ស៊ី help.

Tony Dittenhoffer has been making the rounds of local clubs, including area Probus clubs, telling the story of his time in Poland in early 2022, just on the other side of the border from Ukraine.

Dittenhoffer boarded a flight to Poland in early March 2022, soon after the Russian army crossed into

Ukraine, to do his part to help refugees who have been flooding over the Poland-Ukraine border.

He spent his days sorting and loading trucks with food, medical supplies, water and diapers at a distribution centre run by a local Catholic archdiocese, Caritas Lubelskiej.

"When I left Poland and

my circle of volunteers and when you're in that kind of venue, you make friends very fast — I asked, 'What would you have me do back in Canada?" he said. "Everyone readily agreed: keep up the word. Don't let people forget. Don't let them get comfortable."

It was something he gave critical thought to for several months upon his return. And when he was offered the opportunity to speak to groups such as Probus and Rotary, he iumped at the chance.

His presentation, most recently to the Wasaga Sunbirds Probus Club in November, focuses on his experiences, and ensures the war and its repercussions on the citizens of Ukraine remains at the front of people's minds.

"(Speaking about it) was an opportunity to organize, and reflect," he said. "This isn't 'Tony's trip to Cuba.' It is really a mesh of really important ideas, and the reaction I get from people tells me it's put together in a proper format."

He also encourages people to donate, particularly cash rather than goods, as the cost to send items can be prohibitive. Dittenhoff-

er has been collecting for Caritas Lublin, and anyone wishing to make a donation can reach out to him at ditten.ts@gmail.com.

The ability of his presentation to raise money for the cause became apparent in his first presentation, to the Wasaga Ganaraska Hiking Trail Club.

"My friend came up to me (after the presentation) and said, 'Tony, you have to strike the iron while it's hot,' and she brought \$40 out of her wallet." he said.

Dittenhoffer never took personal risks while in Poland, but he saw many who did, travelling across into Ukraine to deliver supplies or ferry refugees back across the border.

"There never seemed to be a shortage of people willing to do those things," he said.

Throughout his time in Poland, he saw great strength in the Ukrainians he met, in spite of what their country and its people had been subjected to by the Russians.

"I found in my personal experience. Ukrainians are amazing people," Dittenhoffer said. "Never once did I ever come across someone who was getting off a bus, who just spent days under the risk of being bombed, driving late at night with their lights off, not having eaten or had a drink — never once did I ever hear, 'Why is the world letting this happen to me?'

"It was a whole lot of dignity, and that experience just made me want to do more."


