COUNTY HAS SPENT \$105.000 ON HOUSING AND CAR FOR FORMER **HURONIA GUEST** HOME RESIDENTS. AND \$25,000 ON PEST CONTROL

The current tab to address the needs of residents of a privately-run care home in Stayner, after they were forced to move out in March when the owner decided to shut it down, has so far cost the County of Simcoe \$130,000.

That includes \$25,000 for a pesticide company to treat the personal belongings of the residents of Huronia Guest Home for bedbugs before the material could be moved with them to new lodgings, according to information provided to Simcoe.com by county offi-

It also includes \$105,000 in costs evenly split between temporary accommodations for 16 individuals, and half for personal care related to the medical and physical needs of the former guest home residents.

Huronia Guest Home came under scrutiny after social-media posts in early January that documented the home's employees had not been paid for several weeks, and the food purchased for the residents to eat over the Christmas holidays was little more than several packages of bologna and a couple dozen loaves of bread.

The posts also noted the township was attempting to address a bedbug infesta-

tion with the owner.

The posts generated a significant outpouring of support from the community, who stepped up with donations of food, clothing, and bedding.

The home's ownership announced the building would be closed by March, while behind the scenes, a team of organizations that included Clearview Township, the county, the South

Georgian Bay Ontario Health Team (SGBOHT) and the Simcoe-Muskoka District Health Unit, were able to find temporary housing for the residents, and set up personal support care, by mid-January.

County officials say one person is still in temporary accommodations, so the figure provided to Simcoe-.com is not the final amount. County officials are also exploring funding sources to cover its costs.

"We continue to investigate what avenues we can take to receive funding support and costs from other levels of government and involved parties, as well as possible recourses for appropriate costs," said Jane Sinclair, the county's general manager of Health and Emergency Services.

Clearview Township also had minimal costs related to pesticide treatment of the building under the mu-

nicipality's property standards bylaw. which were charged back to the land-owner, according to town-ship chief administrative charged back to the landofficer John Ferguson.

Township mayor Doug Measures said he was very encouraged to see the re- ⊗ sponse by the service orgable nizations, led by the county $^{\mbox{\sc B}}$ and SGBOHT.

"I couldn't be more pleased with the efforts that were put forward by county staff, because they really stepped up where it was needed to help those residents when there was no other avenue from the province, and there is no authority for the municipality to help," he said. "They were there to look after some of those fine details. It was really encouraging to see what a great team the county has, and they should be commended for stepping up in a really difficult situation and dealing with it."

NVCA CALLS FOR MORE FEDERAL SPENDING

It is one of the world's a largest sources of surface freshwater on Earth, and it needs the protection that would come with funding from Canada's federal gov-ស្លី ernment.

That's according to a growing group of organizations that now includes the Nottawasaga Valley Conservation Authority, which is calling on the federal government to live up to a promise to spend \$1 billion to restore the Great Lakes.

"Nearly half of Canada's population lives in the Great Lakes and St. Lawrence River Basin, a region that includes our watershed," said NVCA chair Gail Little. "With accelerated growth in these areas, water availability and quality will continue to decline, putting even more pressure on the Great Lakes. It is critical that the federal government takes their commitment serious-

The NVCA's manager of stewardship services Fred Dobbs sees the work of the NVCA firsthand, overseeing the conservation authorities stream rehabilitation projects throughout the watershed.

That includes work on the Nottawasaga River and its tributaries, as well as rivers — such as Pretty River and Black Ash Creek —

that flow from the Niagara Escarpment through Collingwood, and into Georgian Bay, which is part of Lake Huron.

He noted both the federal and provincial governments contribute some funding to NVCA restoration programs, but more would always be welcome.

"They're willing to make the connection that the work we do in the inland watershed is important to the water quality and health of Georgian Bay," he

"We're grateful for what we've got, but we could alwavs use more."

In 2017, the federal government committed \$44.84 million to protect the Great Lakes through the Freshwater Action Plan. The plan includes six program areas, including preventing toxic and nuisance algae and enhancing the resilience of coastal wetlands. This commitment was renewed in 2021 with the promise of an investment of \$1 billion over 10 years to restore major bodies of water across the country. However, only 19.6 million was budgeted for the plan in 2022.

In response to questions Simcoe.com, spokesperson for Environment Canada said the budget allocation for 2022-23 was made to "sustain the Freshwater Action Plan, while decisions on the

plan's long-term direction are being considered."

As part of the plan, the federal government announced in September more than \$3.9 million would be spent over three years with 39 new projects in Ontario through the Great Lakes Protection Ini-

They were unable to speak to the budget allocation for the coming year, as the federal budget is not scheduled to be released until March 28.

The NVCA restoration projects on the Nottawasaga River include the flagship project, the Nottawasaga River Restoration Proiect, where NVCA staff, partners and volunteers work on sections of the Upper Nottawasaga River, Pine River and Sheldon Creek to improve water quality and restore fish and wildlife habitat.

The restoration work on the Nottawasaga helps to support lake sturgeon,

Canada's largest freshwater fish and a species at risk, Dobbs said.

"The Nottawasaga, south of the Canadian Shield, is probably one of the best rivers in all of southern Ontario for supporting lake sturgeon," he said. "As far as we can tell, we probably have the largest-scale river restoration programs going on in southern Ontario right

NVCA vice-chairperson Jonathan Scott said the conservation authority remains hopeful the federal funding will proceed so that the work on habitat protection can continue.

"Member municipalities in the Nottawasaga Watershed have been clear about how invaluable federal investments are to the enhancement of our watercourses, environment, quality of life and economies," he said. "If the federal government commits to this funding, NVCA looks forward to protect and build resiliency for the towns of Collingwood and Wasaga Beach by reducing nutrient runoff from rural and urban areas."

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CLEARVIEW PULLS CONTROVERSIAL PLAN TO UPGRADE SIDEROAD

Clearview Township has pulled its plans to redevelop Sideroad 26/27.

In a letter to the Ontario Land Tribunal (OLT), provided to Simcoe.com, the township's lawyer Harold Elston advised that the township would be withdrawing its appeal of a Niagara Escarpment Commission (NEC) decision to deny the municipality's application for a development permit to redevelop the road for year-round use.

The township will also withdraw the permit application, along with the application for an amendment to the Niagara Escarpment Plan (NEP) that would have removed the road from the NEP, ending a process that began in

"We trust that this letter will suffice to allow the NEC and the Hearing Office to close its files on these matters," Elston wrote in a letter dated March 22.

Upgrading 26/27 to yearround was part of a settlement agreement between the township, the County of Simcoe, and Walker Aggregates, and endorsed as part of the 2012 Joint Board decision to grant Walker a permit to expand its quarry operations west of Duntroon.

As part of the agreement, the portion of County Road 91 between Grey Rd. 31 and Nottawasaga 10th Line would be transferred to Walker, and closed to traffic.

Upgrading 26/27 to yearround use was intended replace 91 as a through-road for local traffic between the 10th Line and 31.

The plan to close 91, and upgrade 26/27, has proven controversial for neighbours and the local environmental group, Blue Mountain Watershed Trust (BMWT). In particular, BMWT — which sided with the NEC at the OLT took aim at the township's level of environmental assessment it undertook to support its application to upgrade 26/27, calling on the Ministry of Environment, Conservation and Parks (MECP) to require a higher standard of review.

In late 2021, at what was to be the outset of the OLT hearing, the MECP advised the township it was reviewing its environmental assessment process, and in December, informed the municipality it required a 'bumped-up' EA to be undertaken.

The development application process had cost the municipality approximately \$1.6 million in legal and other consulting fees by the end of 2022, funded

through a reserve account created as part of the settlement agreement that saw Walker provide \$7.5 million to the township to upgrade the road network around the quarry.

In a news release issued later on the 22nd, Mayor Doug Measures stated while the expenses to date have not fallen on taxpayers, "moving this matter forward would needlessly cost our taxpayers.

"What was once a practi-

cal, reasonable and cost-effective proposal to manage local traffic in the vicinity of the Duntroon Quarry ... has been met with opposition from individuals, groups, some of our municipal neighbours, and various departments and agencies of the Province of Ontario," he stated. "Over the past dozen years, the township has been faced with the rescinding of approvals granted by provincial departments and agencies,

and the introduction of increasingly onerous changes to the law and policies that govern municipal road authority and projects events beyond the township's control that make the improvements no longer practical, reasonable, or cost-effective."

The township's statement did not address what would happen with the settlement agreement. Municipal officials did not immediately respond to questions regarding the status of the agreement.

In the release, Measures said he was "certain" a positive outcome can be reached.

"Council and I will work with local stakeholders, including Walker Aggregates, to find a solution that we are confident will protect the environment, the local road network, and the needs of our residents,' he said.

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



Overtime costs helped to push 19 Wasaga Beach firefighters high onto the town's submission to the Ontario Public Sector Salary Disclosure list for 2022.

Thirty-nine employees with the town were on the list, which documents employees of publicly-funded organizations — including municipalities, hospitals, and colleges — who earned \$100,000 or more in the previous calendar year.

The town's former chief administrative officer, George Vadeboncoeur, topped the list with an income of \$208,883, with a taxable benefit of more than \$1,200. Vadeboncoeur retired in November.

The next four on the list were captains with the Wasaga Beach Fire Department, including Kevin Pike (\$183,387); Glenn Hyland (\$174,779); Kelly McGuire (\$162,338), and Jason Cameron (\$160,260).

Firefighter Donald Bishop, also a training officer with the department, was sixth on the list with a salary of \$158,646. Their

boss, Chief Craig Williams, was next on the list with a wage of \$152,166.

Williams said the "primary contributing factor" for higher salary costs for the department was the medical leave absence of four firefighters.

"These absences created a total of approximately 19 months of overtime, which was required to maintain the minimum staffing requirements found in our collective agreement (four firefighters on duty 24/7)," he said.

Williams said all four have since returned to work.

Other factors contributing to higher salary costs in the fire department include overtime required for CO-VID-19 isolation, the addition of a one-time statutory holiday for Queen Elizabeth's passing and a collec-

tive agreement requirement to cap the firefighter's overtime bank, resulting in a payout of banked hours, Williams said.

Former chief Mike McWilliam, who retired in early September, was also on the list at \$135.772.

Clearview Township had 13 employees on the so-called Sunshine List, starting with chief administrative officer John Ferguson. Ferguson, who joined the municipality in early 2021, was the township's top earner in 2022 with a salary of \$179.532.

Others on the list for the township included director of public works Mike Rawn (\$138,435); director of finance Kelly McDonald (\$131,324); public works manager Todd Patton (\$122,913); and deputy director of public works Dan Perreault (\$121,939). Former fire chief Roree Payment, who had been on leave since March 2022, also made the list at \$121,589. Payment left in January and recently was hired on as deputy chief for Tiny Township.

The township's interim chief, deputy chief Scott Davison, was paid \$105,688.

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




